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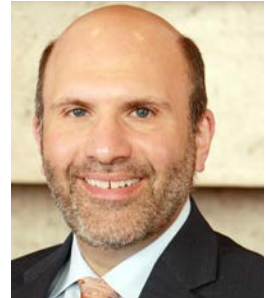
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YEAR IN REVIEW

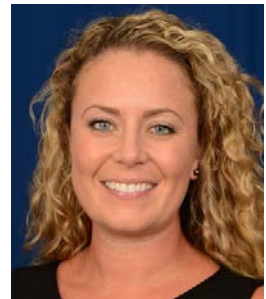

2023 ALUMNUS OF MERIT BRIAN MILLER '79

New York State Assemblyman and MVCC Alumnus of Merit Brian Miller '79 is proud to be a lifelong learner.

From his years of experience as an engineer to working as an apple farmer to serving his constituency, Miller has gained all kinds of knowledge. "I learn something every day," he says. "I yearn for that knowledge. I want to know about things."

With an uncle who was a draftsman, Miller entered MVCC in 1977 set on what he wanted to do—become an engineer and a draftsman like his

uncle, so he enrolled in the Drafting Technology program. "A lot of kids changed career paths; I didn't," Miller says.

While at MVCC, he was taught to be industrious, and says that he had a lot of great professors who trained him for the jobs for which he'd be applying.

After graduating, Miller went on a job interview where he was asked if he could take a bike apart and put it back together. "Of course," he recalls saying. "Putting it back together was a lot of what we learned [at MVCC]."

Engineering jobs in the area were scarce, though, when Miller was first looking. It was just when the landscape of Utica's workforce was changing and many of the factories were closing.

Interested in seeing the western United States, Miller took his skills to Missoula, Mont., where he spent a year working at two civil engineering companies, resurveying mining claims and logging roads near Eureka and Glacier National Park.

When he came home, he was able to secure a job with Homogenous Metals in Herkimer. He began working in the company's factory and moved to the engineering department as a draftsman after six months, eventually working his way up to design engineer. Miller says many of his co-workers were from MVCC, too. "It was a great experience, and during that time, that's when I got into the public life."

In 1993 at the age of 33, Miller ran for Bridgewater Town Supervisor, another career field that ran in his blood. His grandfather served as a Town Judge in Paris and his uncle was a Town Councilman. "When I was in high school, they always told me I was going to be the aspiring politician along the way, so I guess public life was always a calling, some place I wanted to be," says Miller.

It was during this time that Miller purchased an apple orchard when the opportunity arose, and Miller's Orchard in Bridgewater was founded. This venture taught him a lot about how to apply his skills in a new way. "When you're an apple grower, you're many things," Miller says. "You're a chemist. You're a mechanic. You're an engineer. A lot of the machines, we had to work on or design parts. You had to market and you had to advertise."

After eight years as Town Supervisor, Miller was approached to run for the Oneida County Board of Legislators. He served for 16 years, during which he sat on every committee, was assistant majority leader, and chaired the public safety, public works, and government reform committees. It was in this capacity that he set up the Fire Hawks scholarship with MVCC, which he says is one of his biggest accomplishments.

The Fire Hawks scholarship provides 10 \$5,000 stipends a year for students who commit to volunteering at a fire department for three years, take at least six credits per semester, and maintain a 2.0 GPA.

"We talk about it everywhere we go and it's a great opportunity not only for the young people but everyone who wants to volunteer in fire service and wants to continue their education."

In 2016, Miller entered office after being elected to the NYS Assembly. He recalls that when he first went to Albany, someone commented that he wouldn't fit in well because he was an engineer, but he disagreed.

"Government's there to help people," he says. "It's not there to find ways to say no. We always try to find a way to help. We do a root cause analysis and then we come up with a corrective action plan. That's the way we look at bills. That's the way my staff looks at things. It all comes back to [MVCC]."

Miller says he's led a pretty interesting life and hopes to leave a legacy in his wake that helps someone else, similar to the legacy he's so far left in the engineering field.

"Every piece of material that goes through Homogenous Metals goes through a machine that I designed," he says. "They're numbered, M1, M2, M3, M4, and the M stands for Miller. I'm no longer there, but a part of me is still there."

He adds that his greatest accomplishment may yet come tomorrow, and it all started at MVCC.

"It was a great place to go, and hopefully it'll be a great place for a lot of people to go for many, many years to come."

ERIC KOWIATEK '08



Eleven years ago, Eric Kowiatek '08 got a life-changing lesson in being in the right place at the right time.

“A friend of mine caught wind that there might be a professional hockey team coming to Utica,” he says. “At the time, the idea was that it was going to be the Utica Flames. He made a fan club page and then I made the logo and then some more graphics. That page got discovered.”

Soon after, Kowiatek received a call from Utica Comets owner Rob Esche looking for the creator of the web graphics. He ended up doing a lot of small design projects for Esche and was ultimately offered the graphic designer position for the Comets.

Leading up to this opportunity, Kowiatek chose to attend MVCC and enrolled in the Applied Computer Science program. He says he learned about web design, enough to help him with some basic work, but he found his calling in his design classes, especially Theory of Light. “At some point, I learned that the design half of that program was really what I liked,” he says.

While the Comets were the affiliate for the Vancouver Canucks, Kowiatek designed the alternate logo, which won the 2015 Best New Alternate Logo of the Year award from sportslogos.net. “The alternate jersey that accompanied this logo is my favorite project I’ve worked on,” he says.

He also designed the original branding for Seventy-Two Tavern and Grill and Kookie’s Q, the rebrand of Babe’s at Harbor Point, as well as the logo and branding for the Utica City Football Club arena soccer team. When the Comets became the affiliate of the New Jersey Devils, Kowiatek also did the rebrand of the logos to reflect that change.

After getting some more responsibilities and gaining respect for his decisions, Kowiatek kept getting promoted in title and responsibility. Now, he’s the vice president of creative services, and he does much more than graphic design.

“I say I’m a graphic designer...but really I’m involved in pretty much everything when it comes down to it, whether it be helping corporate partners on sponsorship and activation, or game presentation,” he says. “During games, I’m sitting in the production room running the video board with a whole bunch of other people.”

Kowiatek grew up loving hockey—its speed and intensity and fun.

“To actually get to work in the sport that I grew up loving in the town that I grew up in, that is one of the most awesome parts,” he says. “Nothing beats a game day when I’m on headset. From spotlights to game presentation, director, replay operator, the producer sitting next to me—that’s the most fun.”

He says working in sports is a big commitment, but he loves being at the forefront of so many positive changes in the area. "The passion for working for Utica, the hometown team, is what keeps me going," he says.

That hometown passion extends to his experience at MVCC. He says he always recommends MVCC to his nieces and nephews as a great place to get started in college. "The classes there are just as good as you're going to get everywhere else and the professors are amazing," he recalls.

Kowiatek says that especially for those in the design field, MVCC is a great place to get the experience needed to get a job. "There's a lot that you can do at MV that can help you build up a portfolio that you can then turn around and show to other people and show your experience," he says. "When you can actually show a portfolio of work or show a resume that has experience, that's what really matters these days more than the four-year degrees."

In the 2022-23 academic year, the Foundation's Scholarship Committee (supported by subcommittees of faculty and staff) reviewed hundreds of applications and awarded 372 scholarships totaling more than \$393,000 to 188 individual students in a wide array of academic programs.

NEW SCHOLARSHIPS AVAILABLE IN 2023-24

Thanks to the generous support of our alumni, friends, and donors, the Foundation has added four new scholarships to its list of nearly 140. These scholarships will be available to students in the 2023-24 academic year. They include:

Dr. Carmelita Lomeo-Smrtic Memorial Scholarship for Childhood Education

Dr. Carmelita Lomeo-Smrtic served MVCC as professor, education program coordinator, and director of education. In addition to serving as a teacher, she also acted as a consultant and presenter in her field. Throughout her career, she received multiple requests to present at conferences throughout New York State, which brought MVCC to the forefront of childhood education innovations and placed the College at the top of the field. She was widely cited in professional journals and served in leadership roles in numerous local, state, and national professional organizations. Lomeo-Smrtic's greatest passion was for her students and teaching. Her main objective was to help students attain excellence in their profession by teaching them the skills and giving them the opportunities to become teachers of the highest caliber. She received the SUNY Chancellor's Award for Excellence in Teaching in 2004 and was inducted into the MVCC Hall of Fame in 2016. The Dr. Carmelita Lomeo-Smrtic Memorial Scholarship for Childhood Education was established in her memory by family, friends, and colleagues.

Dr. Francis R. Dunning Memorial Scholarship

This scholarship was set up in memory of Professor Emeritus Dr. Francis R. Dunning, who was a scientist and innovative educator. Dunning taught math and science at Madison Central, Frankfort, and Herkimer Central School before starting his career at MVCC where he was Professor in the Physical Science Department and Dean of the Division of Technology and Business. He taught from 1963 to 1995. He pioneered use of industry advisory committees and led the creation of programs in Chemical Technology, Photonics, and Solar Energy Technology. He won several prestigious National Science Foundation grants and received the SUNY Chancellor's Award for Excellence in Professional Service in 1990. Dunning was inducted into the MVCC Hall of Fame in 2003.

Henry Wester Scholarship

This scholarship was created by MVCC alumnus Brian Wester, who enrolled at MVCC as a returning adult student at the age of 35, graduating in 1983 with a degree in Biology. He continued his education at SUNY ESF with a degree in Paper Science and Engineering and was employed by Hammermill Paper Co., Thilmany Paper, Weyerhaeuser, and Domtar. Working in pulp and paper mills, he provided technical support and worked in R&D, and holds 18 U.S. Patents.

Wester's mother immigrated from Germany in 1922 when she was 9 years old. She did not graduate high school but went on to become self-educated and spent many years working as an assistant librarian. She was very involved in her community, founded her children's school PTA, and served as a Cub Scout leader, volunteer election worker, on the library board, and on the local cultural committee.

Wester's father, Henry, was a pattern maker, making patterns for metal castings and wooden models. Henry did not attend college but provided for his family and community as a Boy Scout leader, part-time policeman, volunteer firefighter, and fire chief.

Wester and his brother were the first generation of their family to attend college. This scholarship honors the values and lessons Wester learned from his parents and supports the needs of current MVCC returning adult students by providing scholarships for tuition, fees, and books.

Spire Honor Society Scholarship

Spire is a national honor society that recognizes the unique achievements of adult students and other nontraditional students enrolled in associate degree programs who have overcome significant obstacles to achieve academic success.

Being part of the Spire Honor Society is more than a special designation. It is a symbol of great academic achievement and a place to make connections and grow personal and professional networks.

This scholarship will be awarded to current members of Spire who demonstrate leadership, persistence, and future promise.

Aman Awais '19, Engineering Science, is employed as a systems engineer at Plug Power Inc. and does intensive research and development within the realm of fuel cell systems.

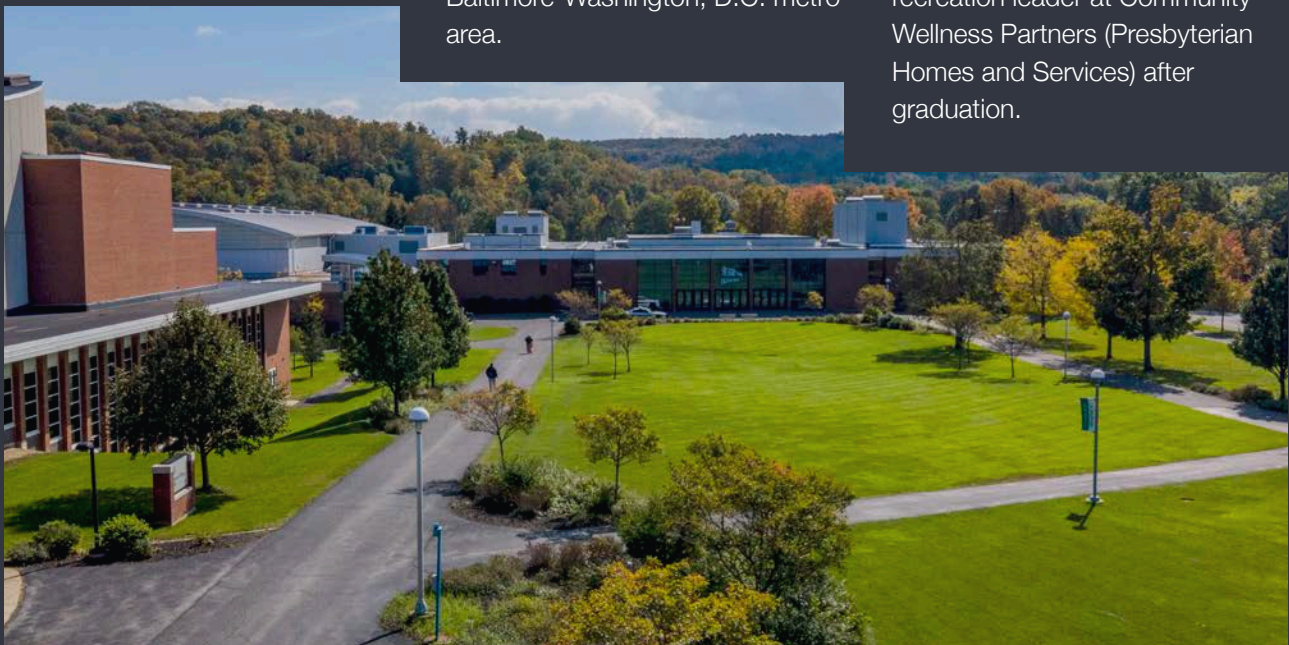

MVCC HALL OF FAME CLASS OF 2023

Four esteemed individuals were selected for induction in MVCC's Hall of Fame as part of the Class of 2023.

The Hall of Fame recognizes those who have embraced the community, modeled the way, inspired confidence, and encouraged excellence at MVCC. Selections are also chosen based on business or professional achievements, leadership support and involvement at MVCC, significant contributions to MVCC athletics, and any other appropriate qualifications.

Gary Broadhurst

Gary Broadhurst retired in 2022 as Administrator and Professor Emeritus after serving the College for 43 years. For 26 of those years, Broadhurst was Dean of Athletics,

directing one of the most extensive, diverse, and successful two-year college intercollegiate programs in the country. Not feeling like his career is over, Broadhurst continues to serve MVCC as a part-time Administrative Advisor to Athletics.

Broadhurst began his career as a Technical Assistant and became part of the faculty in 1988, achieving the rank of Professor before being appointed as Director, and later Dean, of Athletics in 1996. He served as Head Coach of Men's Basketball, Women's Basketball, Men and Women's Bowling, Softball, and Golf. He has taught almost every course in the department's curriculum. He also is recognized by the State Education Department as a certified instructor in the Coaching Certificate curriculum. He also oversaw the building and operation of the Robert R. Jorgensen Athletic/Events Center, which opened in 2011.

During his tenure, Hawks teams captured 20 NJCAA National Championships while finishing second an additional 20 times; 81 Region III Championships with 67 runner-up finishes; and 144 Mountain Valley Conference titles. MVCC student-athletes have been selected as NJCAA All-Americans 484 times, 1,329 were recognized as All-Region, and 172 have been individual NJCAA National Champions. Six student-athletes were selected as NATYCAA Scholar Athlete of the Year—more than any other institution in the

nation—and 34 were chosen as SUNY Chancellor's Scholar Athlete of the Year. The Hawks won the inaugural NATYCAA Cup in 2004 in the non-scholarship division and have never finished lower than 15th in the history of the national award, which recognizes excellence in comprehensive athletic programs.

Broadhurst sits on NJCAA Foundation Board of Directors and chairs the Hall of Fame selection committee. He has served on the NJCAA Board of Regents and chaired numerous NJCAA committees. He previously was both the Men and Women's Regional Director and Chair of the region's Executive Committee for more than 10 years. He also has served as the treasurer for the Mountain Valley Collegiate Conference for more than 20 years.

Broadhurst is actively involved in national professional organizations, including the National Alliance of Two Year College Athletic Administrators (NATYCAA), of which he previously served as president and treasurer. He also served on the executive committee of the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) and was on the New York State SUNY Athletics Oversight Committee.

Broadhurst has been the recipient of numerous awards during his career, including the NATYCAA L. William Miller Award, NACDA Athletics Director of the Year (2007, 2012, 2016, and 2019), the NJCAA Loyalty Award, the SUNY Chancellor's Award for Excellence in Professional Service, and was selected as inaugural NJCAA Region III Athletic Director of the Year.



Coach Robert W. Gould

Coach Robert “Bob” W. Gould retired from MVCC in 2022 as Associate Professor Emeritus after a 43-year career in which he served as a coach, mentor, professor, and colleague with a

tireless work ethic who exemplified what it means to be a Hawk living the College’s values.

Over the span of his MVCC career, Gould served as Head Coach for Baseball, Men’s Tennis, and Men’s Soccer, the latter being the sport he coached the longest—38 years. He consistently led Men’s Soccer to the top four of the NJCAA Region III, one of the most competitive regions for men’s soccer in the nation, taking them all the way to the Region III tournament multiple times and amassing 368 overall victories. Eight of his players were recognized as NJCAA All-Americans, and MVCC soccer players set every statistical record during his tenure.

As a professor, Gould taught most of the courses within the curriculum of the Athletics Department and was active in designing new curricula. In addition to mentoring his students and student-athletes, Gould mentored other faculty and planned wellness initiatives for College employees. He assisted with multiple accreditation visits and enjoyed celebrating the achievements of students and colleagues alike, serving as a frequent Commencement Marshall and a member of multiple Excellence in Service committees.

A proponent of giving back to his community, Gould was an active member of the Mohawk Valley Soccer Referees Association, the Utica Board of Soccer Officials, the Utica Board of Women’s Basketball Officials, and the Coliseum Soccer Club, through which he received the President’s Award in 2007-08. He also served on the Ted Moore Scholarship Committee and was the pace cyclist for its annual eponymous Run/Walk.

Gould has received numerous accolades over the years, including NJCAA Region III Division III Coach of the Year (1998), Mountain Valley Conference Coach of the Year (multiple years), and Region III and Conference Co-Coach of the Year (2007). In 2019, he was named to the NJCAA Soccer Coaches Association Hall of Fame.



Lorie L. Phillips

Lorie L. Phillips, Professor Emerita, worked with MVCC’s Respiratory Care program since its beginning in 1974. Over the next three and a half decades, she dedicated her career to

educating her students, ensuring they received the most up-to-date information and procedures so they could provide the best possible care to their patients.

During her tenure at MVCC, Phillips held every position that existed in the Respiratory Care program. After working for four years as a clinical preceptor for MVCC while working as a Registered Respiratory Therapist and assistant director of respiratory therapy at Faxton Hospital, Phillips was hired as an Instructor and Clinical Coordinator for the Respiratory Care program in 1978. Phillips held the Clinical Coordinator position until she became a part-time adjunct clinical instructor while she and her husband raised their two sons. Phillips rejoined the program full-time as an Assistant Professor/ Clinical Coordinator in 1989, became the Respiratory Program Coordinator in 1996, and continued to rise through the academic ranks, becoming a Professor in 2004. She maintained the Coordinator position until her retirement in 2017, but even then, Phillips stayed on as an adjunct faculty member through 2018 and as a tutor until 2019. She now serves the New York State Assembly as a constituent liaison in Assemblywoman Marianne Buttenschon’s office, a role which combines her passion for civil service and health care.

Phillips’ commitment to the College and the program ran deep. As the Coordinator, she was instrumental in transitioning the program from a one-year certificate program to a 1+1 associate in applied science degree program in 1997 and then to a straight degree program in 2002. She shepherded the program through three successful accreditation site visits, frequently collaborated with the Nursing program to have students on both sides learn about and appreciate each other’s knowledge bases, was active in the recruitment process for incoming students, achieved more than \$200,000 in equipment donations, and helped design the program’s new lab built in 2000.

As a professor, Phillips worked hard to ensure graduates were knowledgeable, skilled, and safe. In her more than 35 years of teaching, she guided more than 600 students to become respiratory therapists, a challenging task that included treating some of the sickest patients in the hospital receiving mechanical ventilation in Critical Care Units. She also helped some students complete their program when their education was interrupted, including one student who was called to National Guard service twice and another who contracted active tuberculosis. She regularly earned 50-90 continuing education credits annually though the requirement for licensure maintenance is only 10. Her graduates also consistently met accreditation Thresholds of Success and passed national credentialing exams at a higher rate than the national average.

Phillips maintained memberships with the National Board of Respiratory Care and the American Association for Respiratory Care while a practicing clinician and educator. She has had several papers published, served as a regional speaker on respiratory care topics, and has been involved in many committees, clubs, and organizations serving a variety of groups in health-related and political endeavors. Her accolades include MVCC's Excellence in Teaching and Excellence in Faculty Service awards, SUNY Chancellor's awards for Excellence in Teaching and Excellence in Faculty Service, Cambridge's Who's Who Among America's Teachers, and MVCC's Heart of the Hawk and Heart of Hearts awards.



Russel C. Fielding

Russel C. Fielding, Trustee Emeritus, served as treasurer of the MVCC Foundation Board in 1962 and then joined the MVCC Board of Trustees in October 1970. He acted as Board Chair

from September 1972 until August 1977 and retired in June 1979.

Fielding had extensive military service. He was in the U.S. Army's 222nd Infantry Regiment from June 1944 until September 1946 and served as a First Lieutenant in the 42nd Infantry (Rainbow) Division in France, Germany, and Austria. He later joined the Army's Inactive Reserve and was recalled to active duty in a noncombat role as 1st Lieutenant in Japan and Korea during the Korean War from April 1951 until July 1952. For his service, Fielding earned a Silver Star, Bronze Star, Purple Heart, Combat Infantry Badge, Presidential Unit Citation, three campaign stars, and was inducted into the New York State Senate Veterans' Hall of Fame in 2018.

Following the war, Fielding moved to Rome and worked at the Rome Sentinel from 1947 until 1985, eventually becoming vice president of Operations and Finance and corporate treasurer. He also was president of Associated Dailies, which was made up of the small daily paper in New York State, and of the New York State Publishers Association in 1982.

Eager to serve his community, Fielding ran major fundraising campaigns for the Rome Family Y, First Presbyterian Church, and Rome United Way, of which he later became president. He also was the Rome Public Safety Commissioner, a director of the Rome Chamber of Commerce, was involved with the Rome Industrial Development Corporation, and an incorporating director of Bethany House. He was a part of many boards of directors for community, education, and corporate organizations, including the Rome Chapter of the American Red Cross, the Hospital Plan of Utica, the Rome Labor Management Council, the Mohawk Valley Institute for Learning in Retirement, and the Herbert T. Dyett Foundation.



thINCubator Update



During the first half of 2023, MVCC’s thINCubator has maintained its role as the hub for entrepreneurial services in the Mohawk Valley. Faculty hosted over 30 events in 2023 ranging from workshops on website development, workforce development, and AI-Automated Answering Machine Detection to networking events and fireside chats. They hosted five multi-week bootcamps for new entrepreneurs and served more than 107 individual clients through programming and mentorship services—the most served in a single reporting period since receiving the HotSpot designation.

thINCubator cohorts have evolved to include four-week foundational programs for new entrepreneurs as well as eight-week programs for creatives and artists and eight-week masterminds programs for existing entrepreneurs who need to build their network or move faster.

They continue to work closely with their partners at the Small Business Development Center in providing individual assistance to clients from across the region specifically through business plan development, marketing, and customer discovery.

Finally, they have formed new partnerships including the Upstate Founders mastermind program out of Clarkson University, which provides in-kind programming to several of their entrepreneurs. thINCubator also has been awarded \$30,000 in funding through the New Growth Innovation Network (NGIN) Economic Inclusion Incubator program and has partnered with HMJ Equity Consulting (also a HotSpot client) on the application and project

scope which will include crafting metrics to measure economic inequity and gathering data from focus groups on the most pressing needs and what can have the most impact.

Refinery Foundations/Refinery Accelerate/Artist Refinery:

Their multi-week entrepreneurial training programs are held throughout the calendar year and target both new entrepreneurs looking to take their ideas to market, creatives and artists looking to create business models around their art, and veteran entrepreneurs seeking support, mentorship, and accountability. In 2023, two Foundations cohorts, one Accelerate cohort, and one Artist Refinery cohort were held, serving almost 50 clients.

Workforce Roundtable: A two-hour seminar in partnership with the Greater Utica Chamber of Commerce and the Mohawk Valley SBDC brought together local and regional employers, labor resources, and economic development agencies to discuss best practices for attracting and retaining top talent.

The Website Workshop: A two-hour hands-on seminar was held twice this year, during which participants learned how to plan and organize content and resources for their websites. They also discussed pros and cons of different platforms, working with freelancers and agencies, and best practices for deploying high quality DIY websites.

From Beans to Brew—The Utica Coffee Roasting Story:

This networking night was held in partnership with Rising Tides Society of Utica, a group of local designers and creatives. The evening provided networking opportunities and an in-depth interview with Frank Elias, founder of Utica Coffee Roasting Company, on the origin of the business and best practices for longevity, financing, and growth.

Jim Dyer Award Ceremony

MVCC presented the 25th annual Dr. Jim Dyer Award for Academic Excellence in July to Amanda Moyer of Vernon Center, the Liberal Arts graduate with the highest GPA in the humanities.

Moyer was a double major at MVCC who graduated in December 2022 with a high GPA in each of her degrees — Liberal Arts & Sciences: Humanities & Social Sciences AA and Liberal Arts & Sciences: General Studies AS. Moyer, who aspires to be a high school librarian, is now majoring in Adolescence Education English at Utica University, where she was named to the Dean's List in her first semester.

Moyer was honored at a small gathering hosted by the MVCC Foundation and School of Humanities, where she was presented with an award certificate and scholarship prize by longtime MVCC Humanities Professor Dr. George Searles. Also in attendance were family members of the late Jim Dyer, including his wife, Madeline, and the very first recipient of the Dyer Award, Jennifer Campbell, who graduated from MVCC with honors in 1997. Campbell is an educator and designer in Boston with more than 20 years of experience in the field of education and curriculum design.

The Dr. Jim Dyer Award for Academic Excellence was founded by MVCC faculty in honor of Jim Dyer, Ph.D., a beloved humanities professor who served MVCC for nearly 50 years. Upon his retirement from full-time teaching in 1996, the MVCC Board of Trustees named him Professor Emeritus. His passion for teaching kept Dyer in the classroom, and he continued as an adjunct professor through 2011.

To celebrate the Wilcox Presidential/Exceptional scholars and Honors Program students, President Randall VanWagoner, Ph.D., a Michigan community college graduate, and MVCC Executive Director of Marketing and Communications Alen Smajić, a former MVCC Presidential scholar, shared their thoughts on how students should not allow themselves to be defined by one aspect of their lives, and instead should be open to experiences that can lead them down a path they may never have envisioned for themselves.

Wilcox Presidential and Exceptional scholars are students who placed in the top 10% of their high school classes and Honors students apply for the program after graduating high school in the top 10%, meeting the 3.5 final GPA requirement, or having an SAT score or 1240 or higher. Students with a 3.5 GPA with 12 or more college credits also may apply.

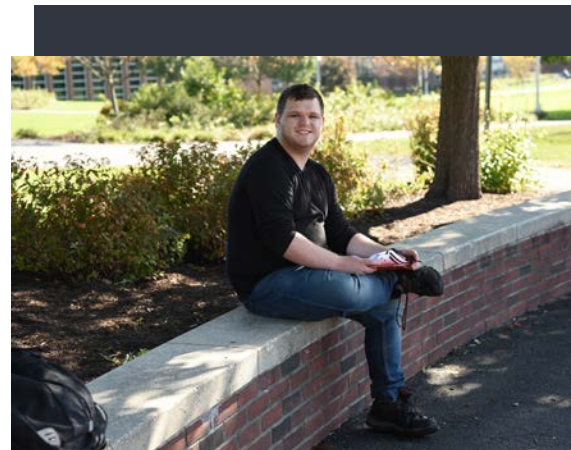

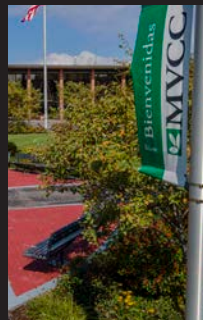
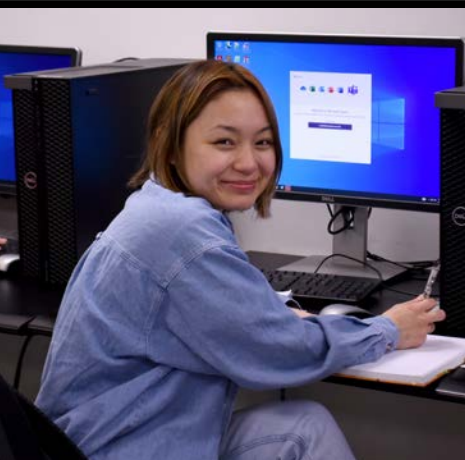
