Tips for Better Mammograms



Perfect timing: Avoid the week before your period when your breasts are extra sensitive.



Ditch deodorant: Antiperspirants have ingredients that can show as white spots on an x-ray.



Dress smart: You only need to undress above the waist, so wear a top that makes it easy for you.



Be consistent: Choose a place that specializes in mammography and stick with it to make image comparison easy.



Speak up: Discuss any changes to your breasts with your health care provider before the exam.

According to the American Cancer Society, Here's What to Expect:

1. You and the technologist will be the only people in the room.
2. Your breast is flattened on the machine's plate for the best image.
3. The imaging only takes a few seconds.
4. If you feel discomfort, just let your technologist know.

The total procedure should only take about 20 minutes, and the full results will be sent to your health care provider.

Don't put it off another day — talk to your doctor about breast health and scheduling a mammogram.
